





# Councilmember Angelia Washington Appointed to National League of Cities Committee

# Second Term for Councilmember

Jacksonville City Councilmember Angelia J. Washington, has been appointed vice chair of the National League of Cities (NLC) 2017 Human Development (HD) federal advocacy committee. Councilmember Washington has served on this committee for three years, and this is her second appointment as vice chair. Washington is the first as well as the first African American Jacksonville City Council member to be appointed to a NLC leadership position.

The appointment was announced by NLC President Matt Zone, councilmember, Cleveland, Ohio. This committee has the lead responsibility for developing NLC federal policy positions on issues involving social services, children and learning, poverty and income support, employment and workforce development, equal opportunity, Social Security and seniors, individuals with disabilities, public health care, mental health parity and immigration reform.

"I'm excited as councilwoman to continue my leadership at the national level," said Washington. "This appointment allows me to collaborate with municipal leaders across America in garnering support from Congress in establishing the 13th Amendment as a national holiday. Advocacy for our nation's citizens further supports action by the Centers of Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to address violence among young African American males, improving educational outcomes for disadvantage students, and ending homelessness for civilians, veterans, and immigrants."

As vice chair of this committee, Washington will play a key role in shaping NLC's policy positions and advocate on behalf of America's cities and towns before Congress, with the new administration and at home. This year's chair of the HD committee is Gil Ziffer, city commissioner, Tallahassee, Florida. Also serving with Washington as vice chair is Zack Reed, councilmember, Cleveland, Ohio.

A native of Jacksonville, NC, Washington is a Ph.D. candidate, North Carolina Agricultural & Technical State University, Greensboro, NC. She possesses a Master of Social Work (Clinical Social Work), Smith College, Northampton, MA; Bachelor of Science in Social Work, Metropolitan State University of Denver, Denver, CO, and a Bachelor of Science in Nursing, East Carolina University, Greenville, NC. The public is invited with special parking to be provided across the street and at City Hall during the ceremony.

# Wilson Boulevard to fully open for traffic

The entire length of Wilson Boulevard will completely open to all traffic beginning Friday, December 23, according to Captain Christopher Adams, Assistant Chief of Staff for Installations and Environment, Marine Corps Installations East-Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune. The ten-year, three-phased, \$203M project began as an answer to the over-stressed main gate during the USMC Grow the Force initiative in 2006. The network of roads, bridges and an added main gate constitutes more than seven miles of roadway.

The new roadway named for General Louis Hugh Wilson, Jr., a World War II Medal of Honor recipient and the 26th Commandant of the Marine Corps, will significantly reduce the traffic flow that is currently routed through officer housing from the Wilson Gate, which was opened earlier this year. Prior to the new construction, the only way to access the Tarawa Terrace area was via Highway 24. The new gate and road will provide access to emergency services for military families without them having to leave the base. The project also features a safe and separate pedestrian path that parallels the entire length of the roadway to accommodate bicyclists, runners and walkers.

"The successful planning, execution, and now completion of the new Wilson Boulevard base entry road project is the result of nearly 10 years of hard work and dedication by hundreds of contractors, civilian Marines, Marines and sailors. It's simply impossible to thank them all for this herculean effort, but each has earned my complete gratitude for their efforts and professionalism," said Brigadier General Thomas Weidley, commanding general of Marine Corps Installations-East.

"My hope is that everyone who has worked on this project derives a tremendous amount of satisfaction knowing they've played a critical role in reducing the traffic congestion that has plagued this base for years. When you consider those quality of life improvements that benefit the most number of people, this one ranks at the top of the list."

In addition to Wilson Gate and Boulevard, there were several upgrades to existing roads aboard the base such as the widening of Brewster and the new service road into the Naval Hospital and Wounded Warrior Complex.








# **Applewhite Accepts Appointment**






