From the Battlefield to the Boardroom

JACKSONVILLE, NORTH CAROLINA (June 27, 2018) How does one sum up a 41-year career of volunteering in a single article? Or honor a man who defined Esprit de Corps on and off the battlefield?

In May, John Eller stood among his fellow Marine FCU Board Members and tendered his resignation. It was time. As you read on, you'll understand why.

Eller earned the title of United States Marine after graduating from boot camp in 1949. His 31-year military career took him through several tours of duty. One in 1967 in particular became a part of history. Following a battlefield commission, 2nd Lieutenant Eller engaged in the Battle of Khe Sanh, leading 220 Marines from Echo Company, 2nd Battalion, 3rd Marines in what became a legendary fight for control over a strategic area in Vietnam.

The following year, Eller was stationed back at Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune in Jacksonville, North Carolina and became a member of Marine Federal Credit Union.

While still on active duty in 1977, Eller volunteered to serve on the Supervisory Committee at the credit union. After retiring from the Marine Corps in 1980, he was appointed a board member and went on to serve as the Chairman of the Board of Directors from 1981 to 2005.

Under his leadership, Marine FCU introduced Automatic Teller Machines (ATMs), checking accounts, credit cards, mortgages, and Touch Teller (24-hour telephonic account access) in the 80s. The 90s brought additional branches, ATMs, and money market accounts.

But that's not all. Eller found time to also serve on the boards of the National Association of Credit Union Chairmen and the North Carolina Credit Union League. In 1985 he was chosen as the Credit Union Volunteer of the Year in North Carolina. Then in 2002, Eller received the Mark of Excellence Award—the highest honor that can be presented to credit union people in North Carolina.

In 2005, he was recognized for his more than 25 years of faithful service and dedication to the credit union community with the National Association of Federal Credit Union's Quarter Century Honor Roll Award.

Current Chairman Marty Goldman said, "I don't know anyone more community service-oriented. I

have been involved with the credit union since 1990 and he (Eller) has more credit union knowledge in his little finger than I do in my whole body. It has been my honor and privilege to serve with him."

Now at age 86, Eller has slowed down just a bit. It's time, but he left his mark on Marine FCU. We take with us this lesson from him as we say goodbye:

"I have tried to surround myself with good men and women. I found these people in the Marine Corps, the credit union movement and Rotary. They believe in service above self ... making a difference in their communities. I have lived my life serving others."

You are the true meaning of Esprit de Corps. Oorah sir!



All About Leadership Jacksonville • Onslow

Jacksonville. Onslow is designed to create a corps of informed and dedicated emerging leaders qualified to lead Jacksonville and Onslow County throughout the 21st Century.

The program will inform, challenge and otherwise educate the participants on the opportunities and needs of the community as well as the dynamics of social and economic changes. The program provides opportunities for networking with people from all areas of the community. Education will be provided for the skills necessary for volunteer community leadership positions. It will encourage the development of interpersonal relationships among the participants which will provide a common ground for working together on community projects. The program will further identify organizational and individual opportunities for community involvement and will encourage continued participation in these activities.

How are Participants Selected?

The class is open to 20 applicants. Members or those employed by members in good standing of the Jacksonville.Onslow Chamber of Commerce will be given first consideration. Participants must be approved by the Leadership Advisory Committee.

What is the Cost?

Program cost is \$625 for Chamber members and \$725 for

What is the Meeting Schedule?

Leadership Jacksonville. Onslow usually meets the second Thursday of each month beginning in August and continuing through May, unless otherwise specified. Most sessions will be from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., some sessions will vary. Additional meetings are necessary for the class project and graduation and will be determined by the class.

What Topics are covered?

Individual sessions focus on city, county, and state government, business and economic development, education, military, health care, and agriculture. The program also includes a session on the basic essentials of leadership and team building skills which promotes teamwork and critical thinking skills.

What are the Attendance Requirements?

Participants are expected to attend all sessions and participate in the class project. No more than two days can be missed in order to graduate. Attendance will be taken in the mornings and after lunch. Leaving early will

What is leadership Jacksonville.Onslow? Leadership non-members. The tuition fee includes all course materials, be counted as a half day's absence. This is not meant as a order to graduate.

Are There Any Additional Requirements?

Participants are required to attend one Onslow County Board of Commissioner's meeting, one Jacksonville City Council meeting and one designated Governmental Affairs Committee meeting on their own time. Those who reside in other towns within Onslow County may receive credit for attending a town council meeting in their own town of residence. Participants are also to choose a committee/ advisory board on which to serve in a shadow leadership capacity. The committee/board may be associated with government, chamber of commerce, or a community organization, but must be approved by the Leadership Advisory Committee. These committees usually meet once a month and the shadow should attend each meeting. As a group, the class must participate in a special project for the benefit of the community. The class will decide the specific project (with approval from the Leadership Advisory Committee) and coordinate all efforts. These additional requirements will take time in additional to the monthly meetings and must also be met to graduate.

The committee seeks representation from a cross section of the community – labor, business, education, government, community service, the arts, the professions, health care, religion, and ethnic and minority groups. Applicants associated with Chamber member businesses in good standing are given first consideration.

A class of approximately 20 individuals will be selected to participate in this year's class. Since the number of selections is limited, applicants who are not selected are encouraged to reapply in subsequent years. The program begins in August and ends in May.

June's Service Member of the Month Sergeant Arthur M. Bain Jr.

Sgt Arthur M. Bain Jr. is distinguished as the Service Member of the Month (SMOM) for the month of June by the Jacksonville•Onslow Chamber of Commerce Military Affairs Committee.

Sgt Bain was born in April 1996 in Queens, New York. He enlisted in the Marine Corps in April 2015. He attended recruit training at Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Parris Island, South Carolina. After graduating recruit training, he attended Marine Combat Training (MCT) at Camp Geiger, North Carolina. Following MCT he attended MOS school at Courthouse Bay, North Carolina, for Basic Combat Engineer (1371).

In December 2015, Sgt Bain received orders to 2d Combat Engineer Battalion, Camp Lejeune, North Carolina where he served as Combat Engineer for Bravo Company.

In July 2016, Sgt Bain received orders to Battalion Landing Team 3/6, 24th Marine Expeditionary Unit (MEU), Camp Lejeune, North Carolina where he served as a Combat Engineer. He deployed to Syria in support of Operation Inherent Resolve.

In October 2016, Sgt Bain along with 24th MEU was activated in a humanitarian mission to aid Haiti after it was destroyed by Hurricane Matthew. While in Haiti serving as a team leader he helped loading food and water on to helicopters to resupply those in need of help in Haiti.

In February 2017, Sgt Bain deployed on the 24th MEU with Battalion Landing Team 3/6 on the Mesa Verde. In the first month, he went to Israel for training with the Israeli Defense Forces. Shortly after, he was sent to Camp Buehring, Kuwait to train for mounted and dismounted route and area clearance for a month. Sgt Bain was sent to Syria as a team leader in May 2017 providing route and area clearance as well as FOB fortification for BLT 3/6 until October 2017.

In March 2018, Sgt Bain received orders to become an Instructor for 2d CEB at Engineer Training Area 9 & 10. Sgt Bain is in charge of the Counter Improvised Device (CIED) class and practical application. He helps the Marines of 2d Marine Division improve in finding IEDs so they are better trained and knowledgeable for deployments.

In April 2018, Sgt Bain won the Meritorious Sergeant Board as well as the Non Commissioned Officer (NCO) of the quarter Board for 2d CEB.

Sgt Bain is described by his leadership as a Marine of extraordinary character. They state that his integrity is unquestionable and he holds himself accountable for the actions of his subordinates and remains patient and calm under stress. At the same time, he is supportive and compassionate teacher, leading his fellow Marines to feel comfortable in approaching him for assistance. They continue to say that Sgt Bain is a superior leader of Marines who exceeds all expectations of a Marine of his rank.
